JESUS helped his disciples understand who he was by giving them pictures they could relate to. Over the next few weeks, we will be exploring the **'I AM'** statements of Jesus in our video talks.

On Friday, the country celebrated the 75th anniversary of VE day. Looking at some of the news reels from May 1945, things were certainly very different from our present circumstances. Not least the huge crowds, packed together like sardines, that came to listen to Winston Churchill. Here are some of his words from that day 75 years ago:

"I say that in the long years to come not only will the people of this island, but of the world, wherever the bird of freedom chirps in human hearts, look back to what we've done and they will say "do not despair, do not yield to violence and tyranny, march straightforward and die, if need be, unconquered." Looking back and remembering are important things to do, especially when it comes to remembering the lessons of the past. Sociologist Robert Bellah, once said, "healthy nations must be 'communities of memory'".

In the Bible, God often encourages his people to remember. He knows how prone we are to forget, especially regarding what he's done for us. To help them remember, God gave them visual reminders. In 1 Samuel chapter 7, it was a stone set up after God gave Israel a great victory against their enemies. The stone was to be called *Ebenezer*, which means "stone of help." From then on, every time an Israelite saw the stone, he would have a tangible reminder of the Lord's power and protection. These days we remember Christ's death through the act of Communion, where we take the bread and the wine, reminding us of his body broken and his blood shed.

A couple of weeks ago in this newsletter, Michele Ovenden encouraged us to produce prayer squares of fabric. One day these will be sewn together and made into a quilt or banner as a way for us as a church to remember this strange episode in our lives and to look back on the lessons that we have learnt: what it felt like to be apart; what God taught us in the stillness; to praise him for all that is past and trust him for all that's to come

Even if you've never picked up a needle before, can I encourage you to do so. Even I'm going to give it a go! It would great for as many people as possible to contribute to this project and have something beautiful to show at the end of what was a difficult time.

SHEEP CHALLENGE!


